



EXECUTIVE REPORT



Over the past two years Australia and the entire world has been experiencing an unprecedented shaking.

THE COVID CHALLENGE

This pandemic has shocked and scared billions of people throughout the world. Sadly, too many precious souls are dying, or are becoming ill with significant medical complications.

Our own dear Fiji National Chairman, Pastor Alipate died of COVID and we also grieve with several of our pastors and people who have lost loved ones in overseas hotspots.

Thankfully, our good and gracious God has provided vaccines in record time, and these will save hundreds of millions of lives through the genius of specialist medicos granted gifts of invention from our loving and all powerful Creator. Some world renown Christ following scientists like Dr Francis Collins (head of the USA's Institutes of Health) have been at the forefront of creating these vaccines and other lifesaving therapies. They affirm that their prayers and those of millions of others are being answered.

The total lockdowns and social restrictions the world's governments have employed to try to arrest this spreading horror, has caused unintended psychological and emotional pain across whole communities. It is fraying social cohesion and with the threat of restrictions on unvaccinated people, another level of distress is occurring.

Most of the reports in this 2021 Update by our CRC Leaders also refer to this pandemic's terrible effects.

A NEW OPPORTUNITY

Despite the pain, suffering and evil that too many precious people are experiencing, we have also seen the Church of Jesus arising with **fresh vision and new dreams and quickly adapting** to this new landscape by learning and mastering new media technologies.

Our CRC Churches have now become proficient in running online worship services, small groups in homes, as well providing innovative teaching, training & coaching reaching across the globe. Our people are being strongly led and fed by their pastors and new leaders and ministers are being spiritually developed for the harvest. New Churches are being planted and many men and women are being ordained into CRC ministry. Zoom and other media platforms are a gift from God and Jesus' Church is seizing the opportunity to move forward in faith with some innovative strategies to reach more people for Christ.

A NEW RECKONING

Over the past couple of years, we have also seen our society wake up to some terribly abusive practices by people and especially leaders. These cover a whole range of areas, not just the horror of the sexual abuse of

children we have all been confronting for some years now.

We are having to face up to the terrible crimes of domestic violence, particularly towards women and the shocking abuse of the elderly and the disabled. The many government Royal Commissions are quite prophetic in exposing some awful dimensions of sin in our world that cry out for justice as well as mercy.

Churches and their many social services arms are also under careful scrutiny in these matters and rightly so. Spiritual abuse, unaccountable financial dealings, governance malpractices and sexual harassment by pastors and spiritual leaders is presently under the spotlight.

This is why I sent out earlier this year to our Pastors, Boards and Churches our Sexual Harassment Policy and our Ministerial Code of Conduct. I trust every Pastor and Eldership discussed these afresh and are ensuring all our local Church employed and volunteer ministry leaders are aligned to these ethical behavioural standards.

Our National Executive also laboured over the past couple of years to frame a *Persons* of *Concern Guideline* for all our Churches. This is a very sensitive one and builds on our *Child Safety Policies and Guidelines* we have been adhering to in recent years, especially after the Royal Commission's revelations and recommendations.

CHARACTER IS KING

For all of us who are called by Jesus and have received His charismatic gifts to serve people, we must also be people of character who practice good conduct.

All our CRC moral and ethical guidelines aim to ensure we don't place charisma above character. Too many high profile Christian leaders around the world (particularly in the USA) have crashed badly with awful consequences for the church, because of a breakdown in this character and conduct domain of their lives. It also doesn't help our

witness before a watching world when these embarrassing failures occur.

My fellow pastors we must learn from this regrettable recent history and grow healthily as a movement.

REVIVAL IS OUR NORMAL

At last years National Conference my latest book *Revival Is Our Middle Name* was launched, and I'm so pleased many of you have written to me about how it has impacted you. For my keynote message at our State Conferences earlier in the year, it was my privilege to build on this theme and share on *What does an on fire, revived movement of churches look like*.

As I was praying it hit me anew, that the very first Jewish Church in Jerusalem, though setting such a good pattern for all Churches, is incomplete. I love sharing on the timeless transferable truths of Acts 2:37-47, but we need to see that the first gentile Church at Antioch gives the full picture we need to follow.

Yes, our CRC Churches need to be biblically grounded, Christ centred, Spirit-led, flowing in the powerful Gifts of the Spirit, dependent on God in prayer and ensuring we are building a loving and caring Christian community, like the Jerusalem Church.

However, to be a truly New Testament Church, we must move our orientation from being **CENTRIC** and become **RADIC**. Jesus used persecution (Acts 8:1) for them to make this shift so they could fulfil the promise and great commission command of Acts1:8.

Antioch Churches are different to Jerusalem Churches due to their **continual outreach orientation**.

Antioch Churches establish **operational bases** to evangelise and plant new Churches. They don't just plant Jerusalem Churches but continually reproduce themselves by birthing new churches.

Antioch churches are into **training and equipping** for ministry and mission and church planting, and don't just provide teaching for maturity.

Antioch churches **give and send out liberally**, and are not just focussed on receiving and gathering into their fold. They sow their best to extend Jesus' kingdom on earth through apostolic evangelism and church planting.

This is the clear pattern in the book of Acts and New Testament letters.

A FAITH CHALLENGE

Let's change our paradigm and **see** our Churches as operational bases. Wouldn't it be terrific if we all individually could be led by the Holy Spirit to **set** a realistic faith goal? If all our 135 Churches could prayerfully **step out** and pioneer a new church every 10 years, it would cause exponential growth. Imagine from 135 to 270 churches by 2031 and then from 270 to 540 churches by 2041. This is compound multiplication.

I encourage you to seriously **prepare**, **pray** and **plan** to become a radic Antioch Church.

Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen. (Ephesians 3:20-21 NIV)

I love our CRC family of ministers and churches and it's a joy and honour to be serving Jesus with you at such a time as this.





The Churches in Victoria and Tasmania have endured lockdowns and **COVID related issues** in two differing environments.

There have been quick responses and adaptions to the various circumstances in each jurisdiction. Tasmania has had less restrictions and a reduced number of lockdowns. They have been able to operate normally from late 2020. Whereas Victoria has had the two different scenarios play out. Melbourne has suffered under the most restricted regime of lockdowns in the Nation, while the rural regions have had less restriction periods, but the most stringent in the Nation for rural areas.

Good things have still been happening while Church leadership has been adapting to these changing circumstances and ministering to people in digital formats.

VIC TAS...

The Youth and Children's ministry teams continued to build the effectiveness of the **Implant Training day.** They trialled it in three locations because of movement restrictions. Each location had a speaker that was streamed to the other sites. It worked seamlessly and there was a 30% increase in attendance across Victoria. We're now planning to incorporate Tassie into this process going forward.

In April, Victorians were fortunately able to travel to Burnie in Tasmania for the **State Conference**. The change of location was appreciated by Pastors and Leaders from both States. Greg and Heather Jones' team did an amazing job serving the movement and the Conference was a highlight of the year for many of the delegates.

The tech teams in Churches have had their moment in the sun. **Online streaming** and film editing services through necessity has meant upgraded equipment and rapid growth in experience. The media-tech teams have been some of the heroes of the lockdowns.

In Victoria, we have seen an elevation of the engagement with ethnic Churches and Pastors. We are welcoming into the movement three Karen (Myanmar) community churches—two in Victoria and one in NSW. Their affiliation will be recognised at the conference. There are two other African pastors being credentialed that will also bring in two new congregations in the near future. The CRC Arabic Church in the north of Melbourne has seen significant growth in the last 18 months under Pr Ghassan Thomas. In Victoria, this is recognition of population growth in cities and large regional centres. It is a development of our Church multiplication strategy and aligns with the Australian Strategic Directions (2018-2023). There have been significant leadership transitions in Churches in regional areas—Portland, Waurn Ponds and Hamilton have new lead pastors. Bannockburn, formerly a campus church of Waurn Ponds is now a constituted CRC Church. We are seeing some Churches moving into campus relationships, Church plants launched through Campuses and Campus Churches transitioning to their own entities. Church planting and leadership structures are changing and shifting according to local needs and circumstances. There is no dominant strategy.

The challenge Church Leaders are facing in the next 1-2 years is how to work with their people to bring back the discipline of **Service attendance and Small Group meetings** in person. There will be for a period of time of adjustment to remote Church attenders being factored into the understanding of Church congregations. How this plays out may be different according to jurisdictions and will require another level of adaptability in the time ahead.

STATE REPORT

SOUTH AUSTRALIA, NORTHERN TERRITORY & WESTERN AUSTRALIA



I am privileged to greet you on behalf of the CRC Churches in S.A., N.T. and W.A. and report to you on the good things God has been doing around our Churches. My hope is that reflecting on these things will remind us of the goodness of God and His presence in every moment of 2021.

Once again COVID loomed large on the decisions and plans for each Church as we navigated all the public health concerns and responded to our State Government's requests. Thankfully though, God enabled us with the grace and wisdom required and we're grateful for how He has helped pastors and leaders in other states who faced much more difficult circumstances. I am extra grateful for our State Pastor, Hans Voortman, for how God has been using him to build up Churches and Pastors and to our State Administrator, David Washington who has kept the steady stream of vital information flowing.

The State Executive has also led the churches well this year and I want to thank Paul Kidney, Cass Tompich, Fiona Voortman, Mark Bettcher, Kevin Hall and Rod Ness. Pastor Kevin Hall has stepped down to devote more time to the Senior leadership role he has taken up at our Seacombe Gardens Church and will be significantly missed.

Our State Conference this year was hosted exceptionally well by the team at Hope Central and we're grateful for their humble sacrifice, service and for the atmosphere of family that they created for us. We focussed on "Rekindling the Fire" and drew our attention to how we must stay in love with Jesus. With sessions on effective spiritual retreats, good mental health, effective preaching and a reflection on how God was calling us to "put our own oxygen masks on first", I felt that God was re-prioritizing His place in our hearts before we wear ourselves out carrying a load for others.

Last year we launched an initiative to strengthen our understanding and ability to utilize digital media for ministry by bringing in a specialist for 6 months to equip people. It was so warmly received that we felt led to look for other areas that could serve our churches in a similar way. This led us to launching a new 6-month position for a Policy Advisor who could help equip our Churches in regards to the mountain of complicated policy and governance. The issues of governance and compliance for

A few churches also completed the milestone of buying and renovating church properties this year, our congratulations to Moonta, Alice Springs and Salisbury on their faith stretching journey's.

God has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in Christ and it's wonderful to see those blessings everywhere I look. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the great spirit of unity across our Churches as we all work together for His Glory.

It's never about beating myself up, but a great opportunity for personal reflection and heart adjustment as needed. One of the things that helps me maintain this life, passion and joy of ministry is the **intentional relationships** I enjoy with our State Executive team and the many of our CRC Pastors and leaders across the State who value the significant connection and relationship we share within our CRC family of pastors and churches. I'm actually energised and strengthened by getting together with our State Executive team, by our regional gatherings and other opportunities we have to connect together.

NSW ACT QLD...

Under current circumstances there is not a lot of specific activities and programs to report on but a few highlights over the past year include:

- Hosting hubs for the CRC National Conference 2020 in various locations across the state including Sydney, Port Macquarie and Narrandera as well as a number of individual homes and offices.
- successfully held in Narrandera in April 2021. Guest speakers Krista & Sean Smith (online) and David Hall (in person) were outstanding, particularly in the timeliness and inspirational nature of their Word. Pastor Bill's message was outstanding as always and the level of fellowship and genuine honour amongst our Pastors and leaders was a feature of the conference.
- been successfully held through the year, depending on COVID restrictions. Pastor Boo does a great job coordinating the Sydney Pastors luncheons, which have been well attended, with our various Sydney Churches alternating as hosts. In the Riverina area we have taken more of an in-service training focus, with various guest speakers including Greg French from C3 Sydney and our very own Nathan Bettcher. At our last 2

- days together we offered the excellent Mental Health First Aid course, ably facilitated by Jodie Elliott, who has attained the necessary accreditation to run the training. We plan to offer the MHFA training to all our credentialed pastors across the State over the next year or so.
- representatives doing significant work in our **Schools**. James Brown from Lifesource Church in Griffith has been a great support in helping with Education Department compliance and also working towards recognition for our home-grown resources being used in some of our public High Schools.
- One of the things I'm glad to highlight each year in my report is the very high proportion of our CRC Churches significantly involved in overseas missions. Although we are unable to travel and visit fields at the moment, I'm aware that most of our Churches are maintaining strong relationships online and providing vital ongoing support.

Perhaps the most challenging area for sustained momentum in these times is in the area of **Youth and Children's ministry**. State and regional Youth events have proven difficult to plan and carry out on a regular basis. Despite this, many of our churches have found innovative ways to connect with and support their Youth and Children. However, I think this is one area where we all very much look forward to some normality and being able to plan and run regular programs and rebuild momentum.

As I consider all our State CRC Churches, I'm greatly encouraged and inspired by a few things.

What a challenging 12 months we have all been through ... filled with such **diversity** and uncertainty. It is difficult to know how people cope with sudden changes, impositions, the curbing of normal freedoms, and the demands on mental and emotions faculties in these times without God being in our lives.

However, regardless of what has taken place around us, our faith clearly and emphatically declares that **God is still in control** and is active throughout this world and there are many wonderful, good news stories to be told; of people coming to Christ, being baptized in water, empowered with the Holy Spirit, wonderful healings and new Churches and home groups birthed ... GOD IS DEFINITELY AT WORK!

Let me share some of the good news stories happening around the world.

NATIONAL MISSIONS OFFERING

Finances raised through the National Mission Offering last year provided several countries with **new communication and recording equipment** for training schools in the Philippines, India, Nepal, Ghana, PNG and other major centres where numbers of other local Churches and leaders nationally connect for teaching, training, pastoral care and communicating with their teams.

It also provided equipment for Jeremy Steel and myself in our teaching and training sessions into the nations.

Personally, I am very thankful this has enabled me to conduct regular weekly training and morale building sessions, as well as live Sunday services into the Philippines, Fiji, India and PNG.

We have also been building an exciting International team of personnel from local Churches in developing Nations as well as from here in Australia who are weekly ministering and teaching live into other nations.

In PAPUA NEW GUINEA

- Recently there were 31 people baptized at Bethel Centre including 10 Indonesian refugees
- New Christian foundation class (new converts) established with 53 currently attending
- 5 new house fellowships started as a result of these new converts (reaching 49 people)
- Also 3 new churches started in the past 3 months in partnership with Bethel church in one the remote districts in the central province
- An additional 3 new churches started in the Milne Bay province in the last 12 months
- New churches birthed in several the provinces of PNG, the Highlands, East New Britain, New Island, Bougainville, Gulf Provinces and some coastal regions.

INT. MISSIONS...

- The Christian school at Bethel PNG
 has had some amazing awards
 throughout the past 12 months in spite
 of the pandemic and is considered
 as one of the top schools in the
 nation, and recently secured official
 authorization to move into secondary
 level education
- Bible Schools in several provinces have reopened this year and Bethel has managed to maintain a teaching program for the staff and some students throughout the past 12 months (2020-21)

In INDIA

- In spite of the devastating COVID situation and the complete lockdowns in India we have been able to have two graduations of our two major training schools –World Missions Training School and the Evangelos International Training Institute. 11 of those graduates have taken up full-time ministry with our CRC work spanning across our bases and schools in several different states.
- In June this year we were able to reopen our training schools with a good number of new students and second year students.
- One of our training schools was able to help fund and oversee the establishment of a new ministry base and church plant in a new state of India which is exciting to see.

In NEPAL

The Leadership Ministry Training School in the Eastern region of Nepal is continuing to train and develop Pastors and leaders. This is being funded and assisted by a local church in Australia.

In THE PHILIPPINES

The Philippines School of Ministry continues to train and mentor young men from different provinces and is reaching out to several other provinces with current local training programs conducted through electronic means.

The local Church in Manila has worked with Bethel Church in PNG to trial a training program of mentoring and developing full time trainees and staff that is working successfully.

There is also a new Australian missionary couple that have been endorsed to go to the Philippines as soon as the nation's borders are open.

In AFRICA

Many training schools being monitored and assisted by local churches in Australia are continuing to function throughout the different African nations. The education of Children and Youth in the various Christian sponsored schools continues to operate even with the disruption of national COVID lockdowns.

Churches and ministries in Canada, USA, UK and Europe, are also continuing to move forward and maintain their vision and growth through their specific ministry expressions.

- The less reliance and use of faith in the presence of the ascendency of human reason

The vulnerability of our Personnel

- The concerns that we all share for the physical safely and particularly their mental health and due to the long periods of COVID pandemic lockdowns and the uncertainties that it brings.
- These concerns that leadership shares are very real and unrelenting and are with us 24/7

The Conflict

OUR CONFESSION IS:



National Day of Prayer/Fasting & National Missions Day

This year the National Day of Prayer/Fasting was Thursday 22nd July, and the National Missions Day was Sunday 25th July 2021.

The Missions Day Offering "Finish What We Started" – the Colombo Project was aimed to finalize the debt. All the money loaned by SA/Vic State Councils has now been repaid, and the final amount presently covered by our Missions Fund needs to be repaid. We are still waiting to receive all this year's contributions to finish what we started.

International Leader's Gathering ILG – October 2nd & 3rd 2020.

In 2020 as there were no international delegates at our Conference due to the Covid Pandemic restrictions, and many Australians could not travel to Adelaide, we took a major step forward with the ILG. It was held online and consequently we were able to have a lot more people involved, particularly from overseas.

The time differences around the globe were challenging, but people responded very well and joined into the Gathering. A session "Missions Training for Young People" led by Pr Jeremy Steel, included 3 young ladies Roxanne Caceres, Mikaela Groom and Purnima was greatly appreciated by the young leaders who were able to join in. The

Step 2 - Missionary Training Intensive

Step 3 - Missionary Exposure (1-3 Months)

Step 4 - Further Training at World Missions Faith Training School (WMFTS PNG) or Missionary Service

This year we have been able to conduct the 1st step Missionary connect weekends in two separate locations, Adelaide South Australia, and Orange New South Wales. Over the last 12 months CRC Training (CRCT) has achieved many goals including fully stepping into our partnership with Alphacrucis (AC). We have seen it continue to strengthen and allowing new course options to become available; including the June announcement that in 2022 the Diploma of Chaplaincy will become a course in the offering. The CRCT Certificate of Christian Studies (VET) was also launched with 15 students commencing study in early 2021.

We have 34 Higher Education students completing either a Diploma or Bachelor with CRCT (including a Syrian Refuge based in Turkey who is an AC Scholarship Student). This past year has also seen our students in Poland complete their studies. In September 2020 we held a graduation online, where 21 students graduated. Amongst those graduating were CRCTs first Bachelor level students. CRCT also had another 12 members of the cohort complete their study in Trimester 3 2020, and a further 8 over 2021 until June. Over the State Conferences we were pleased to celebrate with 11 CRC Training Alumni who received a credential.

In February we hosted our first reVive Event with guests, Drs Barry and Vanessa Chant. This event was held live at Reveal Church with 30 in attendance and an additional 50+ registered online. Shortly after, we hosted our first camp for 2021 with guest speakers Suzie & Peter Botross, Brian Birkett and CRC Pastors across the week. In late March CRCT was involved in Implant Conference, which was run over three venues. We are thankful to our Alumni who enabled us to have representatives at each location.

In April, a small team of 6 travelled to Hamilton at the invitation of Grace Fellowship to run the entire Sunday service. We are keen to see this replicated in other churches as the invitations are received, as it is a blessing to the Students, Churches and Staff involved.

The last 12 months have also seen the team at CRCT working on a rebrand, which we are keen to launch over this conference period. The College's vision, mission and core values are the same as the movement. We are launching our four operational values, Foundation, Formation, Connection and Commission which undergird our day-to-day operations.

Finally, this year has only been possible because we are blessed to have such an amazing, dedicated team and movement. Our staff and students are located throughout Australia, as is our National Training Board. We are very thankful to our team and for your continued prayers and support as we continue to partner with local churches, to see people equipped and released for ministry.

My thanks to those who have assisted me in the National Office during the last year including Kassie Pidd, May Kirkland, Brenda Giles and Michella Hunter. Also to the teams in the Missions Office and CRC Training Office. I look forward to serving our movement over the next 12 months as we continue this ministry journey together. For the Year Ended 30th June 2021

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Preparation

This special purpose financial report has been prepared for distribution to the members to fulfil the financial reporting requirements under the CRC Churches International Australia Inc constitution and the Australian Charities and Not-for Profits Commission Act 2012. The board has determined that the entity is not a reporting entity.

CRC Churches International Australia Inc is a not-for-profit entity for the purposes of preparing the financial statements.

The financial report, except for the cash flow information, has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on the historical costs convention. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is the functional currency of the entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107: Cash Flow Statements, AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures.

(b) Income Tax

The entity is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(c) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

(e) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from donors and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

(e) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from donors and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(f) Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the CRC Churches International Australia Inc's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting year. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year, together with entitlements arising from wages & salaries and annual leave, which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable after one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made for those entitlements.

(g) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment are brought to account at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The carrying amount of Plant, Property and Equipment is reviewed annually by the Board to ensure it is not in excess of the future economic benefit of those assets. Individual items of plant and equipment in excess of \$500, which do not constitute a replacement, are capitalised.

Assets are depreciated on a diminishing value basis and the depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

(h) Reserves

Reserves for Future Conferences

Funds have been put aside for use towards the annual national conference, and have been preserved for that purpose.

Missions Resettlement Fund

CRC Missions receive funds which are specifically designated to certain missions. These funds are recorded as revenue when received by CRC Missions and are recorded as an expense when the funds are paid to their designated purpose.

Church Planting Funds Held

Funds that are received for church planting are recorded as income when received and as an expense when paid to their designated purpose. Any remaining funds are preserved until spent.

(i) Revenue Recognition

The entity recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that future economic benefit will flow to the entity and specific criteria have been met for each activity as discussed below.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Donations

Donations are recognised as revenue when received.

Grants and Gifts

Minor grants and designated gifts are recognised as revenue when received.

(j) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount being normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(k) Financial Assets

Financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the association's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amoritsation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.
